PROFILES AND ABSTRACTS (SSZ 2018)

DASTUR Dr. KERSEY H. ANTIA is high priest of the Zarathushti community in Chicago since 1977, and has served as an honorary priest for over half a century. A fully-ordained priest with the Best Boy medal and the Prefect Medal from the the M.F.Cama Athornan Institute in Mumbai, Dr. Antia studied religion and Avesta-Pahlavi under Dasturji Dabu, Mirza and other learned priests, and has won essay prizes from K.R. Cama Oriental Institute and other institutions since 1956, and Avesta-Pahlavi scholarships in college. He has lectured widely and is author of numerous papers on religion and psychology. A clinical and management psychologist in private solo practice in Illinois, he is also affiliated with several hospitals. He is listed in several Who's Who and included in Outstanding Religious Personalities and Scholars of the 20th Century and others.



Rev. Dr. BRIAN ARTHUR BROWN is a family man with two adult children and eight grandchildren ranging from one to thirty years of age. He is a minister of the United Church of Canada, currently serving as Scholar-in-Residence at First Baptist Church in Niagara Falls, NY, just ten minutes from his Canadian residence. He is the author of 20 books on the quest for peace and harmony between aboriginal natives and non-aboriginal Canadians, French and English in Canada, Canadians and Americans at war and in peace, and, in recent decades, interfaith texts which are used worldwide.

Brown's Three Testaments: Torah, Gospel and Quran, was published by Roman & Littlefield in 2012 and launched in the presence of ambassadors from the USA and 19 other countries at the Canadian Embassy in Washington, following the burning of the Quran earlier that year, an event hosted by Canadian Ambassador Gary Doer and the US State Department. It was followed in 2016 by *Four Testaments: Tao Te Ching, Analects, Dhammapada, Bhagavad Gita*. The two books are a set, soon to be joined by a third, *Seven Testaments of World Religions*, published as a trilogy. The new book will include a heightened emphasis on the debt owed to Zoroastrianism by all seven World Religions: Judaism, Taoism, Confucianism, Buddhism, Hinduism, Christianist and Islam – the theme of our discussions in Chicago.

Brown holds a bachelor's degree in Classics from Dalhousie University in Halifax, a master's degree in Theology from McGill University in Montreal, a doctorate in Ecclesiastical Organizational Behaviour from the San Francisco Theological Seminary at the University of California, and has done post doctoral Studies in Executive Leadership at Harvard University. He is currently a member of the Oxford Round Table at Oxford University and in 2015 he was named by HRH Queen Elizabeth II as a Fellow of the Royal Society for the Arts. Married for over fifty years, Brian and Jenny Brown live in Canada within earshot of the thunderous Niagara Falls.

<u>Abstract</u>

The Dead Zee Scrolls: Zoroastrian Concepts Buried in the Scriptures of the World Religions

1. I begin with reflections on Vedic lore as the "oldest testament" in world religion. This is the first articulation of religious experience after the earlier universal expressions of devotion to Sky-Father and Earth-Mother which were found in every primitive culture. Vedic polytheistic religion of the Russian Steppes was reformed and refined in the revelations to Zoroaster as found in his Gatha poetic prayers and in other parts of the ancient Avesta, lost parts of which can be referred to as "The Dead Zee Scrolls." Such Zoroastrian material, when found someday, may be compared to The Dead Sea Scrolls which unexpectedly turned up in the 1940s to verify truths of Hebrew Scripture. Archaeologists currently searching for the Dead Zee Scrolls might be humorously compared to *Indiana Jones and the Raiders of the Lost Ark*. Dating the life of Zoroaster is of interest but "Zoroastrianism" burst onto the world scene in the Persian Empire under Cyrus the Great. Under

Cyrus, the Magi priests converted to this religion *en masse* and spread teachings of Zoroaster from one end of the Silk Route to the other. Their influence affected the birth of 5 religions. Confucianism, Taoism, Buddhism, reformed Hinduism, and Judaism, the latter giving rise later to Christianity & Islam, all display marks of what scholars now call the Z source.

- 2. Those include Vedic marks refined by Zoroaster in reference to the "older testament" seven days creation story, earlier deities appearing as angels and demons, Satan, last judgement, Messiah, salvation, heaven, hell and other elements of religion. These elements were inherited by Jewish prophets from Zoroastrian priests in Babylon and are recognizable in popular culture today as the Zoroastrian legacy to the modern world. For example, Christian scholars spent most of the 20th century debating the relative influence of Greek philosophy, Egyptian mythology, Gnostic wisdom and the Hebrew Old Testament in trying to define the origins of Christianity. The answer was under their noses all the time in the influence of Zoroastrianism, listed above. These aspects of Christianity were derived from Zoroastrianism, partly through the Jewish filter and partly in direct connection with Zoroastrianism will be traced in a similar way when we consider Salman Farsi and reference to Sabeans and Majus in Quran and the place of Zoroastrian scriptures in the Quran.
- 3. The Zoroastrian legacy in religions which began on the eastern portions of the Silk Route is different but equally obvious. Research at the University of Philadelphia is now accepted as proving conclusively that the Magi were present and influential in China during the time when Zoroastrianism had flared up in the west. This was also the time of the Buddha in India, followed by a reform of Hinduism, as witnessed by the scriptures of the Bhagavad Gita. The Zoroastrian concept of the Oneness of God resulted in monotheism in the west and monism in the east, The latter is the belief that the whole universe is divine, and that we are all part of God, who is worshipped as the "Godhead." Both monotheism and monism, west and east, came in the wake of Zoroaster and the Magi who turned the world from the earlier Vedic polytheism. Other elements of Zoroastrianism found in the east are similar to those found in the west. Many of the original Zoroastrian Avesta scriptures have been lost, thanks to destruction of ancient libraries, first by soldiers of Alexander the Great and later by the followers of Muhammad. The search for these Dead Zee Scrolls is exciting, but not essential to our understanding, since we can now piece together much of what would have been found in the lost parts of the Avesta by comparing suspicious pieces of the scriptures of Judaism, Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism and Taoism, and by their pointed rejection in Confucianism. None of these religions became Zoroastrian, but all of them owe debts to Zoroaster. We conclude with "Z" verses from them all.
